STUDY OF BACTERIA IN COLD SPRING HARBOR

Mayor DeVita briefed the Board about the results of a Cold Spring Harbor Microbial Source Testing Study, which detected canine fecal material at all sampling locations.

PUBLIC HEARING ON PROPOSED CONTRACT FOR FIRE SERVICES BETWEEN THE INC. VILLAGE OF LAUREL HOLLOW AND THE OYSTER BAY FIRE DEPRTMENT INC. AND ATLANTIC STEAMER FIRE COMPANY NO. 1.

Mayor DeVita opened the public hearing at 6:37 pm.

Mayor DeVita recounted the recent negotiations with the Oyster Bay Fire Department Inc. and Atlantic Steamer Fire Company No. 1, whereby the originally proposed fee structure of an increase one percent (1%) per year was withdrawn as a result of the reassessment of property values by Nassau County. Due to the newly inflated property values, the proposed increase soared to 25%. Mayor DeVita and other Board members explored alternate arrangements for fire protection services, including one with the Cold Spring Harbor Fire Department. Ultimately, a five-year agreement was reached with Oyster Bay Fire Department Inc. and Atlantic Steamer Fire Company No. 1, which contained no increase in cost to Laurel Hollow for the first year and only one percent (1%) increase for each of the next four years.

Following discussion and there being no further questions from the Board or public, the public hearing was closed at 6:56 pm upon motion by Trustee Nicklas, second by Trustee Miritello, and approved by the following poll of the Board.

SET PUBLIC HEARING ON COLD SPRING HARBOR LABORATORY APPLICATION FOR MASTER PLAN REVISION AND SPECIAL USE PERMIT

James Murphy, Esq., attorney for the Cold Spring Harbor Laboratory, requested that the public hearing in connection with the Lab's application to revise its master plan and for a special use permits to construct various new buildings be set as soon as possible. He also requested permission for the Lab to commence construction of a temporary parking lot (south of the tennis court) and a temporary construction access road off of NYS Route 25A. Both the temporary parking lot and access road will be removed at the conclusion of the project. Mr. Murphy further explained that this work is critical for the Lab to mobilize vendors and to be ready for launching the project immediately upon securing all necessary approvals or risk losing a \$30 million grant. After a lengthy discussion, the Board agreed to consider this request at a special meeting to be held at 6:30 PM on Thursday, December 16, 2021. Any approval will be subject to review by the Village Engineer and Building Inspector and contingent upon subsequent approval of the Special Use Permit and the revised Master Plan. Upon a motion by Mayor DeVita, seconded by Trustee Nicklas and approved by the following poll of the Board, a public hearing was set to consider the Master Plan and Special Use Permit on January 6, 2022 at 6:30pm.

PROPOSAL BY KAISER MARINE TO REPLACE SMALL SECTION OF VILLAGE DOCK

This is the last section of dock needing replacement. Mayor DeVita explained that Kaiser is considered to be a "sole source provider" because there is a lack of competition in this line of work and the Village cannot obtain multiple bids. Following a discussion on whether fenders should be installed on the dock to provide further protection, Trustee Miritello moved to accept the proposal and have the Mayor sign the contract. The price of \$795 is unchanged from prior years and the expense will be reimbursed by the Cold Spring Harbor Lab, as part of its contractual agreement with the Village.
