1	MR. AVRUTINE: This is the public hearing on
2	the application of Michael and Denise Ioannou, Case No.
3	P5-2018 and T17-2018, for tree removal. The premises is
4	27 Shady Lane. It seeks approval to remove 36 trees in
5	connection with a building permit for a proposed new
6	single family home.
7	The parcel of property under application is
8	also known as Section 14, Block 26, Lot 8 on the Land
9	and Tax Map of Nassau County.
10	The exhibits in connection with this hearing
11	are as follows:
12	First, an affidavit of posting from Elizabeth
13	Kaye that the legal notice was posted on the front
14	bulletin board in front of Village Hall on June 29,
15	2018.
16	The next exhibit is a copy of the legal notice
17	and affidavit of publication dated July 6, 2018 that the
18	legal notice was published in the Oyster Bay Guardian on
19	July 6, 2018.
20	The next exhibit is a document that confirms
21	that the legal notice was published to the village
22	website on June 27, 2018.
23	And the final exhibit is an affidavit of
24	mailing from the applicant indicating that the notice of
25	public hearing was mailed on July 3, 2018 to the

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Proceedings individuals set forth in the affidavit. Is there a representative here for the applicant? MR. REILLY: Good evening, ladies and

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gentlemen. Thank you for the opportunity to address you this evening. My name is Vincent M. Reilly. I will be representing Michael and Denise Ioannou in their project that they are proposing.

we need to take down a large amount of trees. 9 Many of these trees -- the property has been unkept. A 10 lot of the trees really are in poor health that we're 11 Most of the eastern red cedars are also 12 taking down. 13 diseased. They have an apple cedar blight on them and they really should be removed either way. We need to 14 take these trees down for the larger footprint of the 15 16 house. We're adding driveway through this area, and we 17 need some lawn for the kids to play, and the pool.

In the back of the property, I would like to 18 19 start here, we're going to leave a very large woodland 20 area that's going to remain just woodland. We're not 21 going to be going in there. The only thing that we're 22 going to do here, Mr. Ioannou had said that in the 23 winter you can just see glimpses of this one house 24 that's back here, so to take care of that, thicken the 25 screening and make sure that we have coverage all winter

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long, he wanted me to put in a grouping. These are all 8-to-10-foot evergreens. Definitely block out everything year round.

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This area here represents approximately 17 percent of the property. That's going to be completely unchanged. It will be a really nice greenbelt, wildlife and everything. It kind of connects on both properties with other greenbelt areas. So it will be a really nice woodsy area. It won't feel like you are wall to wall sod two acres. It will be nice and woodsy.

As we come down on both sides, this is to the 12 13 west, this is to the east, we have a whole string on both sides of large tree. These are all evergreens. 14 15 All the number one, number two and number three, are all 8-to-10-foot evergreens with some other plants that will 16 17 of course grow up and make even a thicker screen, and also it's for the aesthetics. There's a lot of 18 19 flowering plants and whatnot in there.

20 We had several suggestions through the Board 21 through Chairman Hadjandreas and also the village 22 arborist, and we accommodated every one of the things 23 that they had asked for. At first, we didn't have 24 larger trees in one area right here, and the Chairman 25 said that he would like us to fill that entire area in.

So we filled that in with an additional four 8-to-10-foot evergreens.

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3 It was also suggested that we not have the lawn running right down -- this is the road right 4 5 here -- not having the lawn run to the road, to make sure that we have proper screening so it doesn't look 6 7 like so much of a suburban sprawl thing there. There's a huge existing rhododendron here that provides a lot of 8 Then we added this entire bed. This bed has 9 coverage. 10 four 8-to-10-foot Norway spruce in it, and then two 11 8-to-10-foot pink dogwoods, and one 8-to-10-foot red buckeye, along with about I think it was about 20 12 additional shrubs in there and another six or so 13 14 perennials. Nice full bed all the way through there. 15 Also in this corner I added another three Cryptomeria 16 which will be large evergreen trees to block out that 17 area. So basically the whole way across the front of 18 the property will be blocked out from the road, give a 19 nice screening, and be very attractive.

20 One of the biggest things that we had to deal 21 with was the changing of the driveway on this side. 22 Ms. Bibla wanted to save three trees over here, numbers 23 four, five, and six on your plan. To accomplish that, 24 we had to move the driveway.

The original driveway had come right out a lot

1 closer to the property line, and, you know, it took in the three trees that we're talking about right there 2 3 that we were going to save. This is, in the orange color, that is the new proposed driveway that -- we 4 really wanted to save that, but in an effort to please 5 the Board and to move things along, they reluctantly 6 7 said, yes, change the driveway. So I brought it over and now it complies with what the arborist wanted, and I 8 think it works well also. It also gives us a large area 9 here that is woodsy, and, you know, have trees in there, 10 kind of again a little bit of a greenbelt, a little bit 11 of a natural look to it there. 12

And she also -- there are two trees right in here, number 15, number 17, they're two Norway spruces. She had suggested that -- they were coming out because of the dry wells. She suggested moving the dry wells back in a little bit, and it seems to be a very reasonable thing to save the trees. So that's what we will do, and we'll be able to save those two trees.

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20 Over the weekend, apparently, you guys visited 21 the property. There are three white pine trees here. 22 They're old white pine trees. The only branches on them 23 are way up top. They do nothing for screening and 24 whatnot. So it was suggested to me that we can take 25 those out and just thicken this up better and give a

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1 better block. Also, the white pines -- I mean, anyone has them on their property -- like last year with those 2 late snowstorms, they just broke up and made a mess 3 everywhere. So they're not really a great tree to leave 4 on your front lawn. It's going to be messy. 5 So that was a good idea to do that. 6 7 Altogether on the property there's a total of 58 8-to-10-foot evergreens that we're adding, a huge 8 amount, another nine 8-to-10-foot deciduous trees 9 throughout the property, here, over here. There's a 10 11 couple weeping cherries on the corner there. I did not count, but a lot of shrubbery all around the house. 12 Everything is more natural looking. It's not going to 13 be any sort of modern landscaped look. Everything that 14 exists in the neighborhood basically is what's going to 15 be involved in this house. 16 17 So on top of that, I also have a letter. 18 Mr. Ioannou was out over the weekend. He spoke to the 19 neighbor on this side, and he gave this letter stating 20 that he was good with the project. 21 On the other side over here, unfortunately, 22 that gentleman was traveling at the time, but 23 Mr. Ioannou did speak to him. They actually know each 24 other guite well. He's a youth football coach and 25 Mr. Ioannou's son plays on the team, so they're quite

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1	familiar with each other. He's been supportive
2	throughout the project, and he, once again, just
3	verbally expressed that he was behind the program to
4	Mr. Ioannou. He couldn't get anything in writing,
5	but
6	MR. AVRUTINE: Mr. Reilly, I can't read the
7	last name of the person on this letter.
8	MR. REILLY: Do you know the name, Michael?
9	MR. IOANNOU: I don't know his last name.
10	It's Chris
11	MR. AVRUTINE: The last name is a little bit
12	mangled.
13	MR. IOANNOU: It's on the mailing list of the
14	public notices sent out.
15	MR. REILLY: So basically the house is, the
16	building itself, the landscape, it will be a vast
17	improvement over what is there now. There is no
18	screening. There is no screening. The house, I
19	wouldn't call it dilapidated, but it's a 60-year-old
20	ranch house. This is going to conform more with what
21	the neighborhood has evolved into now. I think it will
22	be a large improvement to the neighborhood.
23	And that's it. If you have any questions.
24	MR. AVRUTINE: Regarding this letter, I just
25	want to note for the record, the signatory is a Chris

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1 Velenovsky at 25 Shady. And the letter has been marked as Applicant's Hearing Exhibit No. 1. 2 MEMBER GALTIERI: All right. So in viewing 3 the property yesterday, I understand that there was some 4 concern about the removal of one tree at the -- between 5 6 the new driveway and the screening. Because these two trees here. Two seems to be a little bit far removed 7 from the driveway, but in the context of the landscaping 8 and the beauty that you are putting in, I'd just assume 9 10 let that tree go, otherwise it doesn't quite fit the 11 integrity of the front of the lawn. 12 MR. REILLY: The tree that you're speaking of, 13 I believe we saw today, is an oak tree. Oak trees are 14 nice trees but in that spot, I mean, it's not a specimen tree, it would kind of be a sore thumb. 15 16 MEMBER GALTIERI: And it breaks up the 17 integrity of what you are trying to do in the front. 18 The quid pro quo is as long as the new plantings are 19 dense enough to provide that screening, I'd just assume 20 see that tree go. 21 MR. REILLY: I would agree with that. And it 22 really does nothing for screening. I mean it sticks up 23 in the air. 24 CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: As well as the 25 additional white pines that weren't marked for removal

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1	in your original plan. That's what Mr. Galtieri and I
2	discussed in terms of you were leaving, I think it was,
3	three white pines. The roots are coming out of the
4	ground. They're dropping a lot of large branches.
5	Because, you know, I kind of understand that you had to
6	remove others and these want to be saved, but again, for
7	what reason, just because of a tree count? So replacing
8	those with new trees and additional screening is the
9	direction that we want to see.
10	I wanted to ask Mr. Abrams and Ms. Jones, this
11	isn't something that we discussed when we went there, do
12	you, by looking at the new revised landscape plan, do
13	you have any concerns with what they're proposing now as
14	opposed to what they were originally proposing?
15	MEMBER JONES: How many trees are you going to
16	be taking down?
17	CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: That number had to have
18	changed.
19	MR. REILLY: What we are talking about is
20	basically this one and this one
21	MR. AVRUTINE: Please speak up.
22	MR. REILLY: are the three white pine trees
23	that are coming down. I would imagine it will bring it
24	up to 39, right?
25	CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: The original count

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1	was
2	MR. AVRUTINE: The original, you're talking
3	about the original count?
4	CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: Whatever they applied
5	for, it's going to increase the number by three. Tree
6	number two was already on the list to be removed, and we
7	were saying, when we went there when we went there,
8	we didn't realize where the driveway was going, and we
9	saw now the highlighted driveway showing it's getting
10	within 5 feet of tree number two. There was another
11	tree that we were talking about, but that's squarely in
12	the driveway.
13	MEMBER JONES: So based on that, they need a
14	permit for 35 trees?
15	CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: Okay.
16	MR. AVRUTINE: Thirty-six was the original.
17	MEMBER JONES: And then he added three.
18	MR. REILLY: But actually we gave back five.
19	MEMBER JONES: That's what I'm saying. So 39
20	minus the five, so now you are down to a permit for 34
21	trees 35.
22	CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: One other question
23	MR. AVRUTINE: I just have is there going
24	to be or is the current plan that was submitted, does
25	that depict what you want or is there going to be

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1	further modification from the plan that is currently
2	before the Board?
3	CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: In regards to the Board
4	with the members that I discussed with, this, the new
5	plan addresses all of the concerns. The additional
6	thing that they're bringing to the table now that I was
7	aware of was moving the dry wells inland to avoid
8	removing three or four trees on that side.
9	What is that, the
10	MR. REILLY: That's the east side.
11	CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: So, that wasn't
12	something that was even
13	MEMBER JONES: It's here.
14	CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: well, they're shown to
15	be removed there, correct?
16	MEMBER JONES: No. Shown to keep them.
17	CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: All right.
18	MR. REILLY: It was really a matter of moving
19	the dry wells very little. It wasn't like moving them
20	to the other side of the house. It was moving it over a
21	few feet so we don't interfere with quite so many trees.
22	CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: Looking at the plan
23	there, on my left side, what's there now, there's a
24	significant amount of trees there now. That's all
25	staying pretty much.

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1	MR. REILLY: All the larger trees, yes, stay
2	on this side. We don't have anything coming out until
-	back in this area.
4	CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: That's depicted as an
5	addition to what's there now, correct?
6	MR. REILLY: Um-hum.
7	CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: Do any of members have
8	any other questions?
9	Mr. Abrams, in terms of what was brought up
10	today, Ms. Jones, in regards to the removing of those
11	three additional trees in the front but increasing the
12	density of the screening in the front, do you have any
13	other concerns or questions about that?
14	MEMBER JONES: One of the concerns, Scott had
15	said it too, is removing those ribbons on the trees that
16	are going to be staying now that are on the property
17	line.
18	MR. REILLY: Sure.
19	MEMBER JONES: Especially the concern was the
20	side where the new driveway is going in. I think,
21	because it is was that the swell also or whatever you
22	say that is very over that was the concern also of
23	the arborist, just to maintain that, you know, as much
24	as possible, and you have done that by keeping some of
25	these trees here. But the concern was removing the

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1	ribbons so they do not get cut down.
2	MR. REILLY: I'll go there tomorrow. I'll
3	take out numbers three, four no, four, five and six
4	and 15 and 17. I will take those ribbons off and I'll
5	add the three for the white pines in front that we
6	have
7	CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: We just want to ensure
8	that the correct trees that we're approving stay and the
9	ones that we're saying are gone, go, and we don't want
10	you to there to be confusion.
11	MR. REILLY: Sure.
12	CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: Especially on the side
13	of the driveway there. There is a lot of dead we all
14	saw a lot of dead trees that are, or maybe not dead, but
15	just covered in vines and just doing nothing. We
16	understand all that is going to come out. But the trees
17	that are there that are healthy
18	MR. REILLY: There's a lot of brush and stuff
19	in there. It needs a clean up. Some vines and weeds
20	and some little saplings comes out. But for the most
21	part, we'll have a pretty good size area remaining.
22	CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: Any other questions
23	from the Board?
24	ABRAMS MEMBER: Well, I drove by the property
25	again actually, and it's I think the neighbors are

15 Proceedings 1 going to be thrilled. It really is quite an eyesore 2 right now. MR. REILLY: It's one of the few remaining old 3 ranches in that neighborhood. It's definitely going to 4 conform a lot better. 5 MEMBER ABRAMS: I also appreciate, Mr. Reilly, 6 7 that you went through item by item on what the comments were that Ms. Bibla had and specifically addressed each 8 one of them. I'm okay with the changes. 9 10 CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: I just want to add also that going up Shady, most of the houses don't have the 11 12 screening that we want to see, and Mr. Ioannou is going 13 above and beyond in terms of creating that screening. So I think we're good. 14 15 Is there anybody from the public that wants to speak on this matter? 16 17 MR. AVRUTINE: I just want to make sure that 18 the plan that's on file is the one, or as modified, so that there's no confusion later on. 19 20 CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: Well, there's a new 21 plan now. This is the new plan that's replacing the 22 plan that's on file. So this is what we're going to be 23 accepting. 24 MR. AVRUTINE: Does this one depict what has 25 been discussed this evening, the removal of those white

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1	pine trees?
2	CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: Well, it's showing
3	we're granting permission to remove them. It's not
4	showing the removal. It's showing the screening that's
5	going to be put that was discussed because of the
6	removal.
7	MR. AVRUTINE: Maybe, Mr. Reilly, you can pay
8	a visit to village Hall and just mark and initial the
9	plan in the file that indicates trees to be currently
10	indicates trees to remain that are going to be removed.
11	CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: And that would be on
12	the site plan. But these white pines in the front that
13	are marked to stay, we're going to have to mark and
14	initial to remove and correct the tree count on the
15	permit and ensure that what's marked on the plans to be
16	removed is, you know, removed, and the ones that more
17	so, the ones that are marked to stay, stay.
18	MR. REILLY: Yep.
19	CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: Once they're gone,
20	they're gone.
21	MR. REILLY: Understood. Everything seems
22	very reasonable. What she wanted, we're getting.
23	CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: Just one other matter.
24	The tree count, you didn't count like the trees that
25	were obviously dead, are those part of your tree count?

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1	MR. REILLY: NO.
2	CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: Because they don't need
3	to be.
4	MR. REILLY: NO.
5	MR. AVRUTINE: Just to clarify again, the
6	planting plan is what was submitted this evening and
7	it's dated July 17, 2018?
8	MR. REILLY: Yes.
9	MR. AVRUTINE: And as far as trees to be
10	removed, you're going to indicate the modifications by
11	hand and initialling on the site plan that's on file as
12	well. So what is the as it stands for the Board to
13	act on the application, what is the total number of
14	trees being removed?
15	MR. REILLY: Thirty-four.
16	MR. AVRUTINE: Thirty-four, in accordance with
17	the modifications that we discussed and then the
18	replanting plan as I described?
19	MR. REILLY: Yes.
20	MR. AVRUTINE: Okay.
21	May I have a motion to close the public
22	hearing?
23	CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: Motion.
24	MR. AVRUTINE: Chairman Hadjandreas.
25	MEMBER JONES: Second.

AVRUTINE: Seconded by Member Jones. 1 Let the record reflect that this matter is 2 3 deemed Type II under the New York State Environmental Quality Review Act. 4 And a motion on the application? 5 MEMBER GALTIERI: So moved. 6 MR.
