1	MR. AVRUTINE: This is the public hearing held		
2	by the Board of Trustees of the Village of Laurel Hollow		
3	regarding the 2017 Syosset Fire District Contract.		
4	The exhibits in connection with this hearing		
5	are as follows:		
6	First, excerpt from the minutes of the		
7	January 11, 2017 meeting of the Board of Trustees		
8	setting tonight for the public hearing.		
9	The next exhibit is a proposed contract with		
10	the Syosset Fire District for fire protection in the		
11	area of the Village of Laurel Hollow located south of		
12	Route 25-A.		
13	The next exhibit is a notice of public hearing		
14	prepared by the village Clerk.		
15	The next exhibit is an Affidavit of Posting		
16	prepared by Nicholas Porcaro stating that the public		
17	notice was posted on January 20, 2017.		
18	The next exhibit is an Affidavit of		
19	Publication prepared by Richner Communications, Inc.,		
20	publisher of the Oyster Bay Guardian, stating that the		
21	public notice was published on January 20th, 2017.		
22	The next exhibit consists of documents that		
23	confirm that the Notice of Public Hearing was published		
24	to the Village of Laurel Hollow website and sent to NEWS		
25	subscribers on January 20, 2017.		

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1	As the Board will recall, the Board had		
2	previously and the Village had previously entered into a		
3	contract with the Syosset Fire District to provide fire		
4	and emergency service for that portion of the village		
5	south of 25-A which ran for a period of five years		
6	commencing in 2012 and expiring at the end of 2016.		
7	The agreement that is the subject of this		
8	public hearing is proposed to be for a three-year		
9	duration. Essentially, it's the same formula that has		
10	been utilized during the past five-year term which is to		
11	compare the certain aspects of the budgets the way that		
12	it's in the total appropriations line contained in the		
13	Syosset Fire District's budget for one year and then you		
14	take the year before that, and that's how you determine		
15	the increase.		
16	The long and the short of it as far as the		
17	Board is concerned here is that, I can tell you that I		

will give you the percentages which prevailed under the five-year deal that just ended.

The 2012 was .31 percent lower than 2011. 21 2013 was 2.81 percent higher than 2012. 2014 was 3.01 percent increased over 2013. 2015 was 0.70 percent 23 increase over 2014. And 2016 was a 1.02 percent 24 increase over 2015.

Under the formula as proposed, because

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1	fortunately we have the numbers, the number for 2017			
2	will be the total sum being paid for 2017 is			
3	\$229,704.05, which is 0.69 percent increase from 2016.			
4	So, it's well below the cap. And again, it's the same			
5	formula that we've been using for the past five years.			
6	As far as what the rate will be for 2018, it			
7	will be \$228,409.03. So, we have the 17 number. We			
8	have the 18 number. We do not yet have the 19 number.			
9	TRUSTEE TSAFOS: The .69 is .69 of 1 percent,			
10	right?			
11	MR. AVRUTINE: Yes.			
12	TRUSTEE TSAFOS: And our cap was what?			
13	MR. AVRUTINE: The cap going forward is 1.15.			
14	TRUSTEE TSAFOS: So, this is a little bit over			
15	half of the cap?			
16	MR. AVRUTINE: Correct.			
17	MAYOR DEVITA: Not to interrupt. They			
18	refused. We wanted a cap like we have in Oyster Bay,			
19	and they refused. The good thing was, Howard had gotten			
20	numbers for what we would pay in 17 and 18. They had			
21	figured it out already what the increases would be. I			
22	think they are both below 1 percent. And the third year			
23	is a crap shoot, but given the history, really not much			
24	of a choice and we thought it was pretty safe given that			
25	two out of the three years is at or below 1 percent			

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Proceedings increase. We don't know what it's going to be for 19. 1 TRUSTEE TSAFOS: What I'm worried about is. 2 that their appropriations for some reason decide to 3 skyrocket. 4 5 MAYOR DEVITA: We know that, absolutely. Yes. 6 And trust me, we brought that up. And given the numbers --7 TRUSTEE TSAFOS: It's fine now. 8 TRUSTEE NEMSHIN: They wanted zero years, 9 right? 10 11 MAYOR DeVITA: That's right. They wanted zero 12 years at first. 13 TRUSTEE NEMSHIN: They wanted year to year. So, we got three locked in. 14 15 MAYOR DEVITA: Yes, we don't know. But 16 they're working under a cap also, calculated a little 17 differently, I believe, but they also have a cap. So --18 TRUSTEE TSAFOS: All right. 19 TRUSTEE NICKLAS: Doesn't our cap apply to the 20 entire budget? 21 TRUSTEE TSAFOS: Our cap applies to our entire budget, that's why their variable can affect our cap 22 23 significantly. 24 TRUSTEE NICKLAS: It can. But I think what 25 you are saying though, it's half of our --

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1	TRUSTEE TSAFOS: Cap.			
2	TRUSTEE NICKLAS: But, it's only that			
3	little portion you can't take a portion of our budget			
4	and say that's a half percent higher and then relate it			
5	to			
6	TRUSTEE TSAFOS: I understand that. What I'm			
7	saying is, if we are functioning under a 1.15 percent			
8	cap, I'm trying to understand what kind of cap they are			
9	functioning under. Because if they are on the same cap,			
10	that's fine, we are in lockstep, right, even though this			
11	is a small part of our not that small, just under			
12	10 percent, like 9 percent. But I wanted to try to see			
13	if we are in lockstep with them.			
14	MR. AVRUTINE: I think in relative terms, you			
15	are. And I think what we've always said was, we wanted			
16	to try to keep the increases under agreement, such as			
17	these, at the overall cap that the village has or less,			
18	if you can.			
19	TRUSTEE TSAFOS: That's what I'm going to.			
20	MR. AVRUTINE: I would just like to clarify			
21	the error that I made earlier. The 2017 increase over			
22	2016 was 1.02 percent. And then the 2018 over 2017 will			
23	be the .69 percent.			
24	I also wanted to put on the record that due to			
25	a calculation error by the Fire District, there was a			

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1	refund due the Village in the sum of \$2,898.90 which is
2	being deducted from the payment that is due from the
3	Village to the Fire District on June 1st.
4	THE CLERK: Any other questions?
5	Can I have a motion to close the hearing?
6	Trustee Jusko. Seconded by Trustee Tsafos.
7	All in favor?
