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1	MR. AVRUTINE: This is the public hearing			
2	regarding Introductory Local Law C of 2020. This local			
3	law proposes to amend Chapter 22 of the Code with			
4	respect to the authority of the code enforcement officer			
5	to issue stop-work orders. What it purports to do is			
6	expand that authority.			
7	The exhibits in connection with this			
8	application are as follows:			
9	First, the Affidavit of Publication from the			
10	North Shore Leader that the legal advertisement was			
11	published on February 26, 2020.			
12	The next exhibit is an affidavit from			
13	Elizabeth Kaye that the legal notice was posted at the			
14	Village Hall on February 21, 2020.			
15	The next exhibit is an e-mail from the Village			
16	Clerk to the Mayor and Board of Trustees sent on			
17	February 28, 2020, with the local law in final form			
18	attached.			
19	The next exhibit is confirmation that the			
20	Notice of Public Hearing was published to the Village of			
21	Laurel Hollow website on February 19, 2020.			
22	The next exhibit is confirmation that the			
23	Notice of Public Hearing was sent to Village website			
24	NEWS subscribers on March 4, 2020.			
25	And the final exhibit is a letter from the			

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Nassau County Planning Commission dated February 27 of 2020, that the local law is referred to the Village to take action as it deems appropriate.

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As I indicated, what this essentially does is, it allows the code enforcement officer to issue a stop-work order in connection with any violation of the Village Code, not simply limited to Building Department or Building Code violations.

MAYOR DE VITA: So the genesis of this is, 9 originally the stop-work order was only allowed to be 10 issued in connection with building matters. And then, 11 12 do you remember we had that Designer Showcase matter 13 which we won up through the Appellate Term, but one area that they disallowed was we had issued stop-work orders 14 15 and it was in violation of zoning matters, zoning 16 decisions specifically, and the Court disallowed it on 17 that ground. So after that, we did expand the coverage of stop-work orders to include zoning matters. 18

But we've had a rash in this, you know, very increased expansion of building in our village, a large number of cases where contractors have started work earlier when they are supposed to, they're parking on streets when they weren't supposed to or on the village right of way, and other violations that don't fit specifically in the Village Code or the zoning Code. So

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this amendment is designed to cover that, to give the 1 code enforcement officer authority to have a contractor 2 stop work until they abide by the specific provisions of 3 our code. 4 5 So, that's the genesis of it. MR. AVRUTINE: If I can just supplement what 6 7 the Mayor said. It also gives for someone who disobeys it, in addition to the violation itself for the act with 8 respect to which a stop-work order is issued, it would 9 be a separate independent violation which would be 10 11 subject to fines for violating the stop-work order. So, 12 that adds to the penalty in the event the person who violates the stop-work order does not adhere to it. 13 14 MAYOR De VITA: Any questions or comments from the Board. 15 From the audience? 16 17 Building Department? No. Okay. 18 MR. AVRUTINE: A motion to close the public hearing? 19 MAYOR DE VITA: I'll move.
