MAYOR DeVITA: So, we have a brief meeting tonight. Why don't we dive into our public hearings for the first matter.

The first public hearing will be -
Howard, do you want to do the change in the
local law?

MR. AVRUTINE: Yes.

Good evening. This is the public hearing regarding Introductory Local Law F. It concerns the change to Chapter 88 of the Code. It's an amendment to Chapter 88 of the Village Code.

The exhibits in connection with this hearing are as follows:

First, a copy of the page from the March 18 addition of the North Shore Leader showing that the public notice of this hearing was published on that date.

The next exhibit is an affidavit from Elizabeth Kaye that the legal notice was posted at the Village Hall on March 13, 2020.

The next exhibit is an e-mail from the Village Clerk to the Mayor and Board of Trustees sent on March 27, 2020, with the local law in final form attached.

The next exhibit is a confirmation that the

notice of public hearing was published to the Village of Laurel Hollow website on March 12, 2020.

The next exhibit is confirmation that the notice of public hearing was sent to village website NEWS subscribers on April 2, 2020.

And the final exhibit is a letter from the Nassau County Planning Commission dated April 3, 2020, that the local law was referred to the Village Board of Trustees to take action as it deems appropriate.

This local law is essentially being adopted to effectuate a settlement regarding Active Environmental litigation that they had threatened as they did last year, if the Board will recall, and we're just changing a few provisions so that the settlement can be effectuated. And the Local Law, as modified based upon that which was previously adopted, is the subject of a stipulation of settlement whereby they are acknowledging that the Local Law that we will now have in place is fully and completely constitutional as far as their First Amendment rights and essentially should close this matter as far as the Village is concerned.

MAYOR DEVITA: I just want to add. This basically -- and correct me if I'm wrong, Howard -- I think there's basically three changes and it really could almost say it improves the ordinance, it makes it

tighter.

Number one was in terms of we reduced the time to issue the permit I believe to ten business days. We previously had been out somewhere 20 to 30, maybe it was even 30 days. So, we have ten business days from the time the application is submitted to issue it, which seems reasonable.

We also removed a provision that basically stated the Board of Trustees could impose whatever requirements it wants. It was something very broad which we don't need and it will prohibit future scrutiny on that ground.

And third, we still have a \$50 fee but we had an extra \$200 fee, and I forgot if it was for processing or something. The argument was that that raised the level of the whole application to an amount that wasn't commensurate with the actual costs of providing this license and, therefore, since you're regulating speech even though it's commercial speech, it could be subject to a constitutional challenge. So we agreed to eliminate that. So as Howard said, with these changes we avoid any litigation and most importantly in the stipulation they essentially agree to go away forever.

So, that's the nature of these changes. I think that's it.

1 MR. AVRUTINE: That is correct. 2 MAYOR DeVITA: Okay. All right. So, any discussion from the Board? 3 Rich? 4 TRUSTEE NICKLAS: Is this strictly to do with 5 permits? 6 MAYOR DeVITA: Permits for solicitors. Active 7 Environmental were the guys who went around looking for 8 work on whatever, tree work or tree spraying or 9 something. 10 All right. 11 TRUSTEE NICKLAS: MR. AVRUTINE: Let me -- also, I know this was 12 a concern for a lot of trustees, remaining intact in the 13 chapter is the ability for residents to be on the 14 15 do-not-solicit list. So that anyone who chooses to be on that list, anyone receiving permission or a permit 16 17 for solicitation within the village is moving from soliciting people who choose to be on there. 18 19 MAYOR DeVITA: Anybody else? 20 I'd ask for public comments, but -- one thing, 21 Howard, in this legislative history, it advised keeping, 22 if you close your public hearing, it advised keeping the 23 record open for five days so that the public, assuming

they get wind of it, will have an opportunity to submit

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comments.

Do you see any problem with that?

MR. AVRUTINE: The only problem with it --

MAYOR DeVITA: You're breaking up.

MR. AVRUTINE: The problem with that is that the public hearing is essentially kept open. So if we're going do that, we can't close the public hearing and then adopt the local law and then keep the record open for comments.

MAYOR DeVITA: I'm sorry. Look, I haven't read anything that said you must do this. These are suggestions. But given the difficulty of us getting together and timing and everything, I think we should, just because we talked about this ordinance before in a couple meetings and there's never been any comments, people just want the opportunity to be able to opt out which remains, so I would say we'll just close it then.

MR. AVRUTINE: I just wanted to add that I read the same thing you did, the Mayor, and I believe that it was still under these circumstances with the existing executive orders in place that the Board is really legally empowered to both close the public hearing and to act to adopt it if that's what the Board is planning to do.

TRUSTEE NOVICK: You are very tough to understand, Howard.

1	MR. AVRUTINE: Unfortunately, this is the best
2	I can do.
3	TRUSTEE NICKLAS: You need a new webcam,
4	Howard.
5	MAYOR DeVITA: Ron, just basically what he
6	said, what Howard explained was, he saw the same
7	notations that I did, but that there's no, his opinion,
8	he agrees with mine, is that there's no legal
9	prohibition to us closing the record and closing the
10	public hearing tonight.
11	Right, Howard?
12	MR. AVRUTINE: That's correct.
13	MAYOR DeVITA: So, any other discussions from
14	the Board?
15	MR. AVRUTINE: We need a motion to close the
16	public hearing.
17	MAYOR DeVITA: There's a motion to close the
18	public hearing. I see Trustee Nicklas makes the motion,
19	seconded by Trustee Miritello.
20	So, we'll go and do a poll, the rest of the
21	Board.

20	MR. AVRUTINE: This is the public hearing
21	regarding the Tentative Budget for the 2020 and 2021
22	fiscal year.
23	The exhibits in connection with this hearing
24	are as follows:
25	First, a copy of the Tentative Budget as filed

with the Board of Trustees on March 11, 2020.

The next exhibit is an Affidavit of Posting by the Village Clerk stating that the notice of public hearing was posted at the Village Hall on March 13, 2020.

The next exhibit is a copy of a page from the March 18 addition of the North Shore Leader showing that the public notice was published on that date.

The next exhibit is evidence that the public notice for tonight's hearing and for the Tentative Budget was posted to the NEWS section of the Village Website on March 12, 2020, and forwarded to Village Website NEWS subscribers on April 2, 2020.

And the final exhibit consists of evidence that the Tax Cap Certification was filed with the Office of the State Comptroller on March 26, 2020.

MAYOR DEVITA: Okay. That's it for exhibits?

MR. AVRUTINE: Yes, sir.

MAYOR DEVITA: Okay. So, you know, our budgeting process begins long before now. We have a very meticulous process. We spent this year, basically a whole day, February 8, where the whole board got together and went through the budget line by line and we came up with this tentative budget.

The tentative budget is technically still

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under the New York State tax cap. I will say right out it calls for a 5.75 percent tax increase, and it's still under the tax cap because our also past good budgeting we earned credits and carryovers.

Liz, I think those are the correct terms.

THE CLERK: Yes. Carryover, correct.

MAYOR DeVITA: Which allows us to go over the yearly designated tax cap which this year I'm not sure what it is.

THE CLERK: I think it's 1.78.

MAYOR DeVITA: Something like that.

But in any event, under the budget we had to raise \$153,682 in order to balance, and that was due primarily to two things:

One, increased police costs, which each year they're 4 percent, but it's compounded each year. Four percent is based on the prior year's police budget. Plus there were a number of extra. We also in our contract pay, we call them line item matters, and significantly they involve things like overtime and there's some other calculations in there. But they were up substantially this year and part of that was, there were two police officers out on disability and we only have a 14-member police force, so there were substantial costs.

In addition, we had very substantial outside attorney fees due to the Crown Castle federal litigation. As everyone knows, we were sued. At the very tail end of 2018 and into 2019, we had substantial litigation expenses to defend against that suit.

We're hoping that comes to an end very soon.

But those were certainly unanticipated and those were
the substantial bases for the increases.

But even with that, a quick rough calculation is that the average increase per household in Laurel Hollow will be \$255 per year, and, of course, that can differ depending on your tax assessment. It could go down if your tax assessment goes down. It could go up if it goes up. There are a few other variables. But all other things being equal, it's about a \$255 increase which is a little over twenty-something dollars a month.

So, that's where we're at.

Nick Tsafos, do you want to say some other things about the budgeting and budget process?

TRUSTEE TSAFOS: No. I just think that, Dan, you articulated it very well the way we went through the budget and, you know, how we came up with the numbers.

The Board, you know, like Dan had stated, went through the budget line by line item looking at the prior year's experience with what we're spending, where

we're spending it and what we need for the next year.

And that's how we basically came up with the budget

then. There was a slight increase in taxes.

So, that's basically it.

MAYOR DEVITA: One other thing I'll add is, you know, we operate on a conservative budgeting method. For instance, we are due a total of \$175,000 in State aid on projects that we've completed including the roads and the seawall. We signed our contracts with the State in order to be able to receive that money, and we anticipate receiving that money this coming year. But, we don't budget for it and we don't budget for any State grants or aids because we never know when they're going to let the money go and pay us. So, we know we're owed the money and we anticipate that coming in, but we couldn't budget for that.

Finally, just so it's on the record, we're in the midst of this Corona pandemic, and everything, business, everything is shut down. People are in their houses. No one is basically allowed to do much of anything except go to the store and buy groceries. We don't know how this is going to anticipate, you know, future, the future revenues, expenditures, et cetera. We, Nick, Liz and I, have talked about it. We've come up with some worst-case scenarios, but it's too highly

1	speculative at this point, I think, to change the
2	tentative budget that we've come up on top of which this
3	tentative budget has to be filed by is it April 15,
4	Liz?
5	THE CLERK: No. I think it's later. I don't
6	know.
7	MAYOR DeVITA: But it's April though.
8	THE CLERK: I think the 30th.
9	MAYOR DeVITA: That is one thing the governor
10	has not, you know, postponed or forgiven in terms of a
11	filing date. So, this is our best estimate at this
12	point in time of what next year's budget will look like.
13	That's why we're filing it now.
14	Any comments, questions, anything by any of
15	the board members?
16	TRUSTEE NOVICK: What are the consequences if
17	you don't file by the 30th?
18	MAYOR DeVITA: I don't know. I'd hate to find
19	out because, you know what, what if there are penalties,
20	financial penalties. And I don't know if there are, but
21	given the state of the State's budget, I don't want to
22	be easy pickings for them. There's no harm in filing
23	this now.
24	TRUSTEE NOVICK: What's the consequences,

fines, would be to a village or to any municipality that

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1	does not comply?
2	MAYOR DeVITA: I don't know. But here's the
3	thing, we can always amend the budget.
4	Correct me if I'm wrong, Liz and Nick, we can
5	always
6	THE CLERK: Yes. You can't change the levy
7	once you
8	MAYOR DeVITA: But we can always amend the
9	budget. So, it's a solid budget based on what we were
LO	anticipating. And even if we were to wait, I'm not sure
L1	what that would do.
L2	THE CLERK: And also, if you don't pass the
L3	budget, you can't levy your taxes to bill the residents.
L4	MAYOR DeVITA: That may be the best point.
L5	THE CLERK: It's not even the Comptroller's
L6	deadline. It's our deadline.
L7	MAYOR DeVITA: And the County just sent us the
L8	tax rolls, right?
L9	THE CLERK: Yes. I'm working on them now.
20	Correct.
21	MAYOR DeVITA: So, that may be the best
22	reason.
23	Rich, you had a question?
24	TRUSTEE NICKLAS: Yes.
25	With regard to this averaging, credits, I

guess, Liz, you said we have, so that keeps us under the cap, is that what you mean, you average the last couple of years?

THE CLERK: No. It's a use it or lose it.

Last year we came in 40,000 under the cap. So, you get a carryover. And we had 40,000 to carry over to this year's cap. So, it gave us a cushion that we wouldn't have had otherwise. And if you don't use the carryover, you lose it. It's one year opportunity. So, we were able to actually get up to around 5 percent and change and still make our cap.

TRUSTEE NICKLAS: Okay.

THE CLERK: It's on your schedule.

TRUSTEE NICKLAS: Thank you.

MAYOR DeVITA: Anyone else?

TRUSTEE TSAFOS: Yes. I would just like to add that we should be filing this budget just because the timing of when we went through our budgeting process and when this pandemic hit. It's just that we did it before the pandemic. It happens to be the pandemic is between our budgeting process and our filing. So stick with what we know. Right now I don't think we should change anything. Going forward, like we said, we can amend the budget, and it would be on the cost-cutting side if we had to amend anything.

1	And on the revenue side, it would probably
2	have to be amended. And I don't know if we really need
3	an amendment on the revenue side if State government or
4	Federal government comes in and provides funding just
5	like they did in the private sector. Because the
6	Federal government has taken a position to help people
7	maintain their jobs and continue, help organizations
8	continue through this. So I would think that the
9	Federal or State government would provide some type of
LO	funding to local governments. But that remains to be
L1	seen.
L2	So, let's move forward with our budget because
L3	we don't have any better information to change it now.
L4	MAYOR DeVITA: I agree.
L5	Anything else from anyone?
L6	Howard?
L7	MR. AVRUTINE: Yes. At this time then we
L8	would entertain a motion to close the public hearing.
L9	MAYOR DeVITA: Motion by Trustee Miritello,
20	seconded by Trustee Jusko.
21	Let's poll the rest of the Board.

The first was, Lynn Tone who lives on Cold Spring Road has had an open permit. Because it's a county road, she did driveway work, she had to get approval from the County. This is called a 239-f Review by the county.

So, she came to us last October. The County still hadn't acted on her application. We agreed to extend it another six months with no renewal fee because she's just waiting on the County. She submitted a substantial number of e-mails which evidenced her efforts to get the County to do something. She has a lawyer, Peter MacKinnon -- who I think, Howard, you know -- and contacted Josh Lafazan's office. And there are some communications at the end by one of the officials from the Department of Public Works that it's going to be, given the state of things during the

pandemic, it will be some time. 1 2 So, I suggested to Mike that we extend the 3 permit without fee for a year, and he had no problem with that because, you know, what's going to happen in 4 six months. Even if there was no pandemic, we didn't 5 know if they would get this done in six months, the 6 7 So that was the suggestion. I agree with it. County. So, a discussion. 8 TRUSTEE MIRITELLO: Do we go out longer than a 9 10 year? 11 MAYOR DeVITA: I guess --12 Just not to address this TRUSTEE MIRITELLO: 13 again. 14 TRUSTEE NICKLAS: Dan, this is something, I 15 gather, that the Tones could not control. 16 MAYOR DEVITA: Absolutely. 13	Mayor about three add-ons, bills that came last Friday
14	and I couldn't get into the abstract.
15	A bill from Home Depot for \$1,127.71, the
16	majority of which was the fence at the police booth
17	followed by flowers and seed for Village Hall, the bin
18	for outside the door, some other items. If I can get
19	that added on subject to the Mayor's review.
20	A bill from West Side Engineering for slope
21	analysis, flooding on Laurel Hollow Road, multi modal,
22	elevation certificate. That was for \$760.
23	And Kaiser Marine, their bill to build the
24	float. That was \$5,040 which was previously approved
25	subject to the Mayor's review.

1	MAYOR DeVITA: These three came in. I
2	reviewed the vouchers yesterday. They came in after the
3	ability to do that. So since they're somewhat
4	substantial, I would like to review them, but I would
5	like the approval of the Board subject to my review and
6	approval, these three add-ons.
7	Rich, you have question?
8	TRUSTEE NICKLAS: I do have a question.
9	I was noticing in here this Maidenbaum refund
10	for certiorari for 10,009. That's only one law firm.
11	Do we have other law firms submitting these that we have
12	to refund?
13	THE CLERK: Actually, we have one more from
14	Maidenbaum that I didn't put on because part of their
15	claims were shared with Oyster Bay Cove yet they didn't
16	allocate. So that's going to sit.
17	As of now, no, that's it.
18	TRUSTEE NICKLAS: My second question, how do
19	we budget for these?
20	THE CLERK: We put money in there. We have
21	about \$15,000, I think.
22	TRUSTEE NICKLAS: Okay. We are budgeting,
23	fine.
24	THE CLERK: I forget. There's about ten

properties in that bill. I can't remember how many.

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1 You know, it adds up. 2 MAYOR DeVITA: Just so you know, I don't know 3 if, you may not have noticed, but the fence around the back of the police booth was pretty rotted out and the 4 5 guys put in a four-inch-wide-plank cedar fence. They did it on their own, the postings, built a gate, 6 7 everything. So really, the \$1,127 is just the cost of materials. They did, as usual, a superb job. 8 And the float is the float. We, the Board, 9 had given approval previously for that to be rebuilt. 10 And the \$760, Jim's fees, I just want to 11 12 review. 13 Any other comments? 14 Okay. So, a motion to approve the abstracts 15 with the condition that the three add-ons are subject to the review and approval by myself, by the mayor. A 16 motion? 17 18 Trustee Jusko. Second, Trustee Miritello. 19 I vote yes. 20 Trustee Nicklas? 21 TRUSTEE NICKLAS: Yes. 22 MAYOR DeVITA: Trustee Tsafos? 23 TRUSTEE TSAFOS: Yes. 24 MAYOR DeVITA: Deputy Mayor Nemshin? 25 DEPUTY MAYOR NEMSHIN: Yes.

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1	MAYOR DeVITA: Trustee Novick?
2	TRUSTEE NOVICK: Yes.
3	MAYOR DeVITA: Liz, next.
4	THE CLERK: Just the dental is up for renewal,
5	May. They didn't ask for any increase last year, and I
6	don't even know if it's two years now. So this one
7	they're asking for 3 percent for all the categories.
8	MAYOR DeVITA: In the health care field,
9	that's not a lot.
10	THE CLERK: No.
11	MAYOR DeVITA: Any discussion?
12	TRUSTEE MIRITELLO: Dental is pretty low to
13	begin with, right?
14	MAYOR DeVITA: Well, Liz, what is the total on
15	that?
16	TRUSTEE NICKLAS: \$105.
17	THE CLERK: About that.
18	MAYOR DeVITA: That's the increase, though.
19	THE CLERK: Approximately 3 percent.
20	MAYOR DeVITA: Jeff, you're asking what the
21	total amount of the premium is?
22	TRUSTEE NICKLAS: 265.
23	THE CLERK: Thank you.
24	MAYOR DeVITA: So what's the premium, Liz, for
25	the dental?

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1	THE CLERK: It's separated. I don't have it
2	added.
3	Rich, you added it?
4	TRUSTEE NICKLAS: I added the total here for
5	the renewal rates and it's like 265. That's the
6	3 percent.
7	MAYOR DeVITA: It's 265 a month?
8	THE CLERK: Yeah.
9	MAYOR DeVITA: Okay.
10	Jeff, that's for all the eligible employees.
11	THE CLERK: That's for all the active. The
12	retired is a different plan.
13	MAYOR DeVITA: Anybody else?
14	You need a vote on this?
15	THE CLERK: Yes.
16	MAYOR DeVITA: I'll move to approve. A
17	second, Trustee Nicklas. We'll poll.
18	Trustee Jusko?
19	TRUSTEE JUSKO: Yes.
20	MAYOR DeVITA: Trustee Miritello?
21	TRUSTEE MIRITELLO: Yes.
22	MAYOR DeVITA: Trustee Tsafos?
23	TRUSTEE TSAFOS: Yes.
24	MAYOR DeVITA: Deputy Mayor Nemshin?
25	DEPUTY MAYOR NEMSHIN: Yes.

L4	MR. AVRUTINE: regarding the potential
L5	engineering solution to the problem on Cherry Lane.
L6	MAYOR DeVITA: Anybody on anything else?
L7	Thank you all. In these difficult times,
L8	please stay safe. I don't know when our next meeting
L9	is. It's scheduled for May 13. So, let's hope we're in
20	some ways back to normal by then.
