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THE CLERK: Mayor, do you want the agenda or are you good?

MAYOR DeVITA: I think we're good. It's really just two things. First is the MOU.

Just to give a little background, this

Memorandum of Understanding, MOU, has to do with the

Shellfish Gardening program. Originally, the Shellfish

Gardening program was financially administered by

Friends of the Bay, and they wanted out because it

really wasn't their project. They had all kinds of

problems with people saying that they're using

administrative resources and all this. It started

because the first year we had the Shellfish Program we

started collecting checks and we said, okay, so now what

do we do with the money, and Friends, they said, okay,

we'll take it. So this year they wanted out.

So, I suggested that Laurel Hollow, since we're the main player in the Shellfish Gardening program, take it over. And I checked with NYCOM's general counsel. There's absolutely no problem, he says, as long as there's a benefit to the Village. I said, what about clean water? He says, yes.

So what happened was, there was an \$18,000 surplus on this program, and Friends of the Bay transferred that money to us and Liz set up a special

trust fund so that that money can only be used for that thing, that program.

Now going forward, part of the program, every year we contract with Cornell Cooperative Extension for a number of things, for technical advice, and Barry Udelson is our connection, very good. And, that's where we get the oyster seeds from.

So, that's what this MOU is. It's very simple and very basic. And Howard had a good question, when do we pay over the money. I checked with Rob Crafa who is the coordinator of the Protection Committee, and he said usually it's very early, right away, because CCE, Cornell Cooperative Extension, they purchase these even -- Jeff Miritello, I don't know what they're called -- it's an even tinier thing, and then they raise them to a certain point and then give those to us.

TRUSTEE MIRITELLO: June and July.

MAYOR DeVITA: But they need the money on execution of the agreement in order for them to start purchasing the shellfish seedlings.

So that's what this MOU is all about. It's very simple. And at least now we have the track record with it. This is the fourth year.

Is there any questions about it? Or, Jeff, do you have anything to add?

5	what they charge every year. But just to make it
6	perfectly clear, this is not money that comes out of our
7	budget. This is money that's raised separate and apart
8	from our tax base or any of our revenue. It's really
9	almost not our money. That's why it's in this trust
10	fund account. It's money that's raised from the
11	Shellfish Gardeners. It's deposited separately in that
12	account and the money is spent solely for the program.
13	For instance, there's going to be some
14	supplies, things along the way that we'll have to write
15	checks about. But it's not Village money, so to speak.
16	Okay. Any discussion, anybody in the
17	audience?

20	execute the Memorandum of Understanding between the
21	Village and Cornell Cooperative Extension.

17	that stipulation, we have thirty days for the Board to
18	meet to grant the special use permit and go through this
19	other procedural aspect.
20	MAYOR DeVITA: Okay. Great.
21	I just want to say, thank the lawyers, Todd
22	and Joe and Howard. It's been a hard, long road. And
23	sometimes I know I haven't been easy to deal with on
24	this either. It's been somewhat of an emotional issue
25	because in many ways what's at stake and reflecting on

the emotional responses of the residents. We're talking about people's property. And any time you change anything on it, you're going to have a reaction. But you guys did the top legal job, and I thank you, personally want to thank you.

TRUSTEE MIRITELLO: Do we have to keep all these papers?

MR. AVRUTINE: In most instances, defending any of these types of suits will involve the records that are on file at the village. If somebody thinks that they're really clever and decide to sue board members individually on some wacky theory, then it would be prudent to not have to say, well, I threw everything away. So, yes, hold onto them until we see what if any suits are brought.

MR. MACY: Howard, may I just add something to that. In today's day and age in litigation, e-mails particularly, but any kind of electronic documentation, has become a flash point for discovery. I don't know to what extent you've all communicated regarding this matter via e-mail, but to the extent that you have those, I would strongly urge you not to delete them until we know that this has really been put to bed and that there are no lawsuits out there. Because that will be something that is sought in discovery should this

matter ever go there. I'm not anticipating it. Howard	
has indicated he thinks there may be a challenge. It's	
possible. Obviously, we know there are some residents	
who are not going to be happy no matter what. So, I	
just recommend that you not delete any e-mails, and to	
the extent that you have an automatic deletion feature,	
you might want to disable that at this point in time.	
TRUSTEE MIRITELLO: A copy of the records I

MR. MACY: I know I have everything that you sent to me.

I'm assuming, Todd and Howard, you also.

MR. AVRUTINE: Certainly Joe is going to hold onto that for quite sometime.

MR. MACY: We never delete our materials. So anything you've sent to us, we have.

TRUSTEE NICKLAS: To my knowledge, there's been no e-mails since we sent the ones you wanted for discovery.

MR. MACY: I'm not saying there are or not. It's sort of a precautionary thing.

MAYOR DEVITA: Also, I just want to add, I think the Board did an unbelievable job on this. I mean, really, everybody was involved. And the hearings,

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1	I thought people just were exceptional. All the Board
2	members asked phenomenal questions. And the feedback
3	that I got afterwards from somebody who lived in
4	Huntington who was there, they thought that it was like
5	a different world compared to what went on in
6	Huntington. So kudos to you guys. We're saying that
7	now. Hopefully the People will agree with that. But I
8	think no matter what they end up doing, I think because
9	of everyone's actions, we got the best deal we could.
10	On that note, is there anything else?
