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MR. AVRUTINE: This is the public hearing on
Case Number T25 of 2020 and P5 of 2020, that was T25 and
P5 of 2020, the public hearing on the application of
Sapna Dhariwal, 9 Glen Lane, for approval to remove five
trees in the rear yard. The parcel of property under
application is known as Section 14, Block 13, Lot 29, on
the Nassau County Land and Tax Map.

This property owner received permission to remove five trees in 2018. The code states that any application for a permit to remove more than five protected trees and/or Mountain Laurel during a four-year period including if the removal is in connection with construction must be presented to the Planning Board for consideration and determination.

I see there is a representative here of the applicant. Please give your name and address for the record.

MS. DHARIWAL: This is Sapna Dhariwal, 9 Glen Lane, Laurel Hollow 11791.

MR. AVRUTINE: Thank you. You may proceed.

Please explain to the Board what you want to do and why
you want to do it.

MS. DHARIWAL: Oh, okay. So, I want to remove these trees due to the health of the trees and also a lot of shading in my pool area.

1	CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: Sapna, this is Chris
2	Hadjandreas. As we discussed, the arborist made a
3	recommendation that of the five trees that you asked to
4	be removed, one of them, which is Tree Number Five
5	that's referenced on the permit, be saved and possibly
6	through pruning, slight pruning, not overpruning, again
7	save that tree. And the arborist is recommending
8	removal of the other four trees.
9	Would you agree to adhere to the arborist's
10	recommendations and keep that Tree Number Five?
11	MS. DHARIWAL: Yes, of course.
12	CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: Okay.
13	So, Howard, the Board has spoken, and if the
14	homeowner agrees to adhere to the arborist's

recommendations we would be agreeable to that.

MR. AVRUTINE: Okay.

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There is a I have a question. MS. DHARIWAL: tree leaning, you know, tilting down on my grass and my pool house which is I think is almost dead. arborist noticed herself and she recommended that should be removed. I hope that is under your attention. Just making sure.

CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: It's not part of the five that we viewed, the five that we looked at? MS. DHARIWAL: It's separate, No. No. No.

1	yes. I don't know if you remember when you were
2	walking.
3	CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: I know, but that's
4	going to be a separate matter that I will have to, you
5	know, if it's a dangerous situation, I'll speak with the
6	arborist. We're going to have handle that separately.
7	MS. DHARIWAL: She made a recommendation. She
8	said that must be removed because it's going to fall
9	down and damage the pool house.
10	THE CLERK: She called that Tree Number Six.
11	MS. DHARIWAL: Exactly. That's right.
12	CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: So now
13	THE CLERK: Do you want me to share the
14	report?
15	MEMBER GALTIERI: It's on the report, Chris.
16	CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: Okay.
17	MR. AVRUTINE: The only question is, Chris, do
18	you want to inspect it before any decision?
19	CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: We did. When we did
20	the site view visit we all saw it. I just thought that
21	tree was going to be pruned or whatever and left alone.
22	But if the arborist is recommending removal, I just want
23	to hear from the other board members what their thoughts
24	are.
25	MEMBER JONES: Chris, on her report she lists

six trees. Number Five, she says, to keep. But the
sixth tree is the tree that the homeowner is referring
to, Number Six, that Ms. Bibla said it should be
removed.
CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: Okay.
MEMBER JONES. Co. it la atill five trace the

MEMBER JONES: So, it's still five trees that she's asking to be removed.

CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: My mistake.

MEMBER JONES: That's how I'm reading the report.

MR. AVRUTINE: Let's clarify for the record because that sixth tree was not part of the application. So in order to have that accomplished, the Board would have to agree that it could be amended now to include that tree so the relief would be remove four trees as shown on the plan, One through Four, preserve Five, and then remove that sixth tree that is identified in the Bibla report, if that's what the Board decides to do.

CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: Does anybody on the board have an objection with that?

MEMBER GALTIERI: No. It states clearly -- Chris, can you hear me?

CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: Yes.

MEMBER GALTIERI: It says clearly on this report that it's in poor health and covered with vines,

leaning in a significant way and should be removed.

CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: I just wanted to make sure nobody had an issue.

Scott?

MEMBER ABRAMS: I'm fine with it.

CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: Okay. Yes, Howard, we would. I would, you know, I think we should vote as per your recommendation to amend the agreement, amend and vote.

MS. DHARIWAL: And there's one last thing.

MR. AVRUTINE: Hold on. Go ahead.

MS. DHARIWAL: So, there is a broken tree, right, because I live next to a sump, and there is a broken tree due to the storm which is ready to fall. If you can read the Page 2 under the Number Six, after the Number Six Tree notification, she mentioned about it that somebody needs to notify Nassau County because that tree can actually damage the fence. That's going to be a major problem. How is that going to be --

CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: Ms. Dhariwal, that's also on Nassau County property and that's nothing that falls under -- it's in the sump. I saw what you're talking about, but that's something that as a homeowner you're going to have to notify Nassau County and get them to act on that. And honestly, if I were you, I

would do it formally because then there's a record of it
and if there is any damage that happens to your
property, then I'm sure you'll have some kind of
recourse if you formally notify the County that this
tree is in danger of falling and damaging something on
your property including the fence and whatnot. Again,
I'm not a lawyer but that's how I would handle it.

MS. DHARIWAL: So I have to communicate?

Because I spoke to Joshua Lafazan the last couple of years to take care of the sump and Ms. Kaye also e-mailed from the office, and they have done nothing. I have poison ivy coming from the other side and they just don't want to do anything about it.

THE CLERK: Can you send me a picture and I'll also attach the arborist report and I'll send it to his office.

CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: That's completely out of our purview. Keep going down that road and hopefully they'll act on it.

But other than that, Howard, is there anything else that you require?

MR. AVRUTINE: No. At this point in time let the record reflect that the application has been modified to include the sixth tree that was identified in the report of Elizabeth Bibla that was filed with

1	this application.
2	So at this time, unless the Board has any
3	further comment or questions, would entertain a motion
4	to close the public hearing.
5	CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: I'll make that motion.
6	MR. AVRUTINE: Okay. May I have a second?
7	MEMBER JONES: I'll second it.
8	MR. AVRUTINE: Seconded by Member Jones.
9	All in favor?
10	CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: Aye.
11	MEMBER ABRAMS: Aye.
12	MEMBER JONES: Aye.
13	MEMBER GALTIERI: Aye.
14	MR. AVRUTINE: Let the record reflect that all
15	voted in favor to close the public hearing.
16	Let the record reflect that this matter is
17	deemed Type II under the New York State Environmental
18	Quality Review Act.
19	And we would have a motion on the application.
20	Does anyone want to make a motion?
21	MEMBER JONES: I'll motion.
22	Member Jones moving to approve the application
23	removing Trees One, Two, Three and Four; Tree Five to
24	remain; and Tree Six as identified in the Elizabeth
25	Bibla report also to be removed.

Is that correct? Is that the motion?
CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: Yes.
MEMBER JONES: Yes.
CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: Howard, I would like to
add some verbiage in terms of pruning on Tree Five
should not be significant as to harm the tree.
MR. AVRUTINE: So in connection with the
preservation of the pruning of Tree Five, it shall be
done in a way as to preserve the tree.
MS. DHARIWAL: Yes.
MR. AVRUTINE: That's the motion by Member
Jones.
Do we have a second?
CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: I will second that.
MR. AVRUTINE: Okay. Chairman Hadjandreas.
All in favor?
CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: Aye.
MEMBER ABRAMS: Aye.
MEMBER JONES: Aye.
MEMBER GALTIERI: Aye.
MR. AVRUTINE: Okay. Application approved to
remove Trees One through Four, and Six as per the Bibla
report, Tree Five to remain and be pruned in a fashion
that is designed to ensure its health.
Okay. That completes the public hearing.
