1	MR. AVRUTINE: This is Public Hearing P8-2020
2	and T34-2020, the public hearing on the application of
3	Marisa and Richard Cuccia, 26 Vista Drive, for approval
4	to remove 19 trees, some of which are considered to be
5	in poor health, and to allow for planned landscaping of
6	the subject property.
7	The parcel under application is also known as
8	Section 25, Block 64, Lot 15 on the Land and Tax Map of
9	Nassau County.
10	The exhibits in connection with this
11	application are as follows:
12	First, an Affidavit of Posting from Elizabeth
13	Kaye that the legal notice was posted at the bulletin
14	board in front of village Hall on September 4, 2020.

24	The next exhibit is an Affidavit of Mailing

9	MS. CUCCIA: Yes.	
10	MR. AVRUTINE: Please give your name and	
11	address for the record.	
12	MS. CUCCIA: Marisa and Richard Cuccia,	
13	26 Vista Drive, Laurel Hollow.	
14	MR. AVRUTINE: Thank you. You may proceed.	
15	MS. CUCCIA: What am I supposed to proceed	
16	with?	
17	MR. AVRUTINE: Explain to the Board exactly	
18	what you're trying to accomplish here and the reasons	
19	for it, please.	
20	MS. CUCCIA: Okay.	
21	we're looking to take down some trees so that	:
22	we can do a planned landscape in the backyard. And wha	ιt
23	we did was, we removed a lot of brush throughout the	
24	woods. We had a lot of brush that was overgrown	
25	throughout the years. We've been living here about	

1 25 years now and we want a more manicured look and we want to plant some specimen trees that we've been going 2 looking around for with Grace Landscaping. We are 3 working with Joe. We're looking to put some evergreens 4 and some Kwanzan cherries, dogwoods, amongst some other 5 varieties of trees, and also different types of bushes 6 7 just to make the backyard more beautiful and less wooded I quess you'd say. 8

So, a lot of the trees that we were looking to 9 10 take down, really we didn't pick them ourselves. We had 11 the tree expert come over and he sort of said these are 12 the trees that you probably should remove to put better 13 trees or trees that are going to grow in time and not 14 get choked out by the others because the canopy above 15 was so shaded that we didn't have enough sunlight coming through to be able to put various bushes, other trees, 16 17 flowers, and grass as well.

18 MR. CUCCIA: In addition, several trees are
19 also dead already, one being the largest that we're
20 taking down is a hazard to our house.

CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: Mrs. Cuccia, you
 mentioned you're working -- the landscape designer of
 record, who exactly are you working with?

24 MS. CUCCIA: It's Joe Grace. Joe Grace is the 25 owner of Grace Landscaping and Design. They're in Lloyd

2	CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: The reason why I ask
3	is, we have your plan for a preliminary landscape plan
4	for, you know, some replacements that you mentioned.
5	Typically what happens is, the landscape designer, when
6	the plan is complete, has to sign off saying that
7	everything's been planted in the ground and healthy and
8	all that. So, we need to know the landscape designer
9	because they are the designer of record.
10	MR. CUCCIA: He's familiar with the town.
11	He's done a lot of work in Laurel Hollow over the years.
12	MS. CUCCIA: And I believe he was the one that
13	submitted the preliminary design. Of course, we didn't
14	do a full design yet because it's all based on whether
15	or not we're able to get enough sunlight into the area
16	to be able to plant the various bushes and other things.
17	CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: The Board did a site
18	visit a week or so ago. One of the questions that came
19	up was in regards to privacy in terms of, you know, when
20	you remove trees it's not the only concern is in terms
21	of your privacy but your neighbors' that now maybe
22	you're opening up holes that weren't there previously.
23	Are you planning on installing a fence? We saw some
24	markings on the property line. It's not part of this
25	plan. It doesn't have to be. It's just curiosity from

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the Board if a fence is going to be installed and what type of fence.

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MS. CUCCIA: We're looking to get a permit to do a chain-link fence around the back of the property just in the yard. And we're looking to put some type of hedges and bushes and other evergreens to create, you know, more privacy.

CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: More screening.

MS. CUCCIA: Yes, screening, of course.

10 CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: Because what the Board did notice in the site visit was even with the trees, 11 12 that a lot of the trees that you're looking to remove 13 have very little foliage and a very small canopy up top so they're not offering any screening or privacy at this 14 15 time. And that was noticed by the Board. And I did 16 notice the landscape plan that you put forth in it a lot 17 more lower, more full-type shrubs and trees that would 18 definitely enhance the privacy of your yard and your 19 neighbors'.

MS. CUCCIA: Um-hum.

CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: Do any of the other Board members have any questions for the Cuccias?

MEMBER GALTIERI: My impression was the backyard looks beautiful. Obviously, it's very well attended, and I am sure that whatever gets replanted

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1	will be in similar taste. So, the house looks great.
2	Your house is beautiful.
3	And I'm sure that what they do will be in line
4	with that.
5	MS. CUCCIA: Thank you very much.
6	MEMBER GALTIERI: That's my opinion.
7	CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: And one other thing I
8	want to mention is, everything that Mr. and Mrs. Cuccia
9	want to do is in the rear of the property, nothing
10	visible from the road, from the front of the house at
11	all, and it is, you know, basically near or just outside
12	of one of the property setbacks on the I'm not sure
13	what side of the property that is, but they're affecting
14	basically one side.
15	MS. CUCCIA: That's the west side, I believe.
16	I think it's the west side of the property.
17	CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: Do any other Board
18	members have any questions or concerns?
19	MEMBER JONES: I do not.
20	CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: Now one thing that was
21	brought up by the village arborist, Elizabeth Bibla
22	and you're asking to cut down 19 trees. And we did
23	notice that some of what you are asking for wouldn't
24	even need to be part of a tree permit because of the
25	size or they're actually dead, but we're calling it 19.

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It's significantly less than that because a lot of the trees are under the size of the caliper required even to get a permit. And also, the dead ones don't need a permit, you just need to notify the Village when you're removing a dead tree.

But the one thing that Ms. Bibla mentioned 6 was, and we couldn't determine what this tree was and 7 we're thinking -- you know which one it is -- the large 8 shade tree noted as A-4 on the sketch attached to the 9 10 application. This tree is a 30-inch Acer Norway maple. 11 It has a large cavity at the base of the tree and the cavity is dying back. This is considered a hazard tree 12 because it is in poor health and the proximity to the 13 house and she recommends it to be removed. 14 I don't 15 think you had it as one of the ones that you are going 16 to remove.

MEMBER ABRAMS: It's there. Chris, it's on the plan. It's marked to be removed. We were actually looking at that tree. That was the larger tree that had like a bed around it that was in a bed by itself, and it was dead.

CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: Okay. All right. Sothen that was part of the plan.

Any other questions or concerns from any ofthe Board members?

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1	Does anybody from the public have any comments
2	or questions about this application?
3	MR. LOMBARDO: Chris, this is Joe Lombardo.
4	And, Marisa, it's nice to meet you. We're
5	your neighbors from across the yard.
6	We just wanted to ask, the reason why I'm
7	here
8	MR. AVRUTINE: I'm sorry to interrupt. Can
9	you give me your address, please.
10	MR. LOMBARDO: 5 Waylor Lane.
11	MR. AVRUTINE: Thank you.
12	MR. LOMBARDO: So, I just wanted to understand
13	a little bit better, if you don't mind, what you plan on
14	doing, because it sounds like it is going to be mostly
15	in the back, but what you plan on doing to maintain sort
16	of the barrier between our yard and yours. Not that we
17	don't want to see you guys, but it was nice when we had
18	more of a shield. And I know you guys cleared out a lot
19	of the brush and now it's much more empty. You can see
20	into our house, I'm sure. We can see into yours.
21	MS. CUCCIA: When I'm looking in the back,
22	where are you located? I know that the Abrams would be
23	to my right and the far right corner is McBride. But
24	I'm sorry, I'm not sure which one you are. Are you the
25	house directly behind us with the pool?

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1	MR. LOMBARDO: Yes.
2	MS. CUCCIA: Okay. I know where you are.
3	Yeah, I'm not looking to take any trees along
4	the back between your property and ours away. Except
5	for one tree that was ribboned that is completely dead,
6	we're not removing anything from there. And we will
7	address that area to landscape eventually, but that has
8	nothing to do with the tree removal.
9	MR. CUCCIA: We will be planting evergreens
10	along the back part of the property.
11	CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: The tree that you're
12	saying is dead, just so we can get our bearings on the
13	plan, what number was that so I can figure out which
14	neighbor we're talking about on the plan here?
15	MS. CUCCIA: A-4 is, if you look at A-4, the
16	dead tree, the big dead tree, that one is in between my
17	home and Abrams' home. And all of the trees that are
18	alongside of the property are in between 26 vista and
19	32 Vista which is the Abrams' house. So Mr. Lombardo, I
20	believe, is behind. It's
21	MR. CUCCIA: So on the property line that's
22	adjacent to Mr. Lombardo, there's two dead trees that
23	are coming out now and that's it.
24	MR. LOMBARDO: That's all we wanted to
25	understand because it already opened up a lot and I

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realize that was just a lot of extra brush. 1 MS. CUCCIA: If you don't mind, I would like 2 3 to ask you, I'm not sure if your property, I know where you are located, but we noticed when the landscapers 4 removed the brush that on one area, and it might not be 5 you, it might be the people to I guess your right, that 6 there is like a rusted fence or something that's in 7 there that could be a danger. I don't know whose 8 property it's on. 9 10 MR. LOMBARDO: So if I'm looking at your house from my backyard, to my right? 11 MS. CUCCIA: Yes, correct. 12 MR. LOMBARDO: We'll take a look at it. 13 14 MS. CUCCIA: Okay. Because, you know, it 15 didn't feel that we had any authority to touch it. 16 MR. CUCCIA: We enjoy our privacy as much as 17 you do, and us restoring a buffer that's going to make both of us feel comfortable is definitely part of our 18 19 landscape plan. 20 MR. LOMBARDO: That's all we were trying to 21 understand. Thank you. MS. CUCCIA: You're welcome. 22 23 CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: So one of the issues 24 is, typically a landscape plan -- I understand that it's 25 hard to draw a plan until you know what you're removing,

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1	you know, especially with screening. So you are
2	highlighting, I don't know if I'm looking at your
3	preliminary landscape plan and I'm not sure if the
4	numbers, it says three Kwanzan cherries, so basically
5	you're looking at planting about 15 trees that you
6	highlight on this preliminary plan.
7	MS. CUCCIA: Absolutely.
8	CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: But you think there'll
9	be significantly more or can you elaborate on that?
10	MS. CUCCIA: I'm definitely going to put 15
11	trees in place of the 19 that are coming out. And in
12	addition to that, I want to do hedges and evergreens
13	along the property line to create the privacy. You
14	know, that's what the goal is, to keep everybody you
15	know, private and happy.
16	CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: Right. Now one thing,
17	typically when the Board reviews a landscape plan, we
18	can tie it to a building permit. So basically what
19	happens is the process is we approve it, you know, we
20	approve your landscape plan, and then it's tied to your
21	building permit. What that means is, when you go to
22	close out the permit, besides all the other inspections,
23	electrical, plumbing, whatever inspections you have to
24	get, what I mentioned earlier is the landscape designer
25	of record has to sign off saying this landscape plan as

1	it was presented to the Board in terms of the numbers of
2	what you told us you're going to plant has been planted,
3	the trees are healthy and in the ground. And they
4	attest to that and they self-certify, and then you're
5	allowed to close out the permit. And that works great
6	with the Village because we know it gets done because
7	people want to close out their permit, otherwise they
8	face a lot of fines and penalties and whatnot.
9	The issue is, you do not have any kind of open
10	permit and you do not need a, besides a tree permit
11	which we can't tie this to, you do not need like a
12	building permit. So what's happened in the past when
13	this situation has arisen is basically we asked the
14	homeowners to put up a deposit that you receive back
15	when the plan is completed, when the landscaping that
16	you're putting on here, never mind the hedges and the
17	other stuff that you mentioned, what you committed to
18	planting here on your plan dated there's no date on
19	this, this is just your survey that you amended.
20	MS. CUCCIA: I think it was September 3.
21	CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: Yes, it was received by
22	the Village on September 3, 2020. So, that's how we've
23	handled this situation in the past.
24	If the Board is so inclined to approve your
25	application to remove the trees that you asked to

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remove, would you basically be amenable to putting up a deposit? We are going to discuss the dollar amount on the deposit.

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Howard, I need some guidance on that.

MR. AVRUTINE: The Board has discretion. In the past, I think there's been a number in the range of \$2,500. Something of that nature.

MEMBER ABRAMS: I've got a question, Chris. 8 9 This application doesn't have it checked that it's part of a more comprehensive landscape plan. And I think 10 we've already ascertained that whether or not they 11 12 submitted a plan to do landscaping, that the trees that they're requesting to come down are either dead, under 13 the size limit that's required for a permit or look like 14 they're dying and you would want to take them down 15 16 anyway.

CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: No, I agree.

18 MEMBER ABRAMS: So I understand what you're 19 saying. And we have scenarios where people are asking 20 to take down trees that are somewhat healthy and they 21 want just a different landscape plan or they want 22 different types of trees there and taking them down 23 would create an opening on their property where their 24 neighbors would be able to see. Then we want to 25 understand what are you replacing them with because

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you're going from an area where you have privacy to no privacy if you have no landscaping plan. But they've got the privacy they've got because-- they don't have much privacy there because these trees are already barren and dead. So I don't know. I'm just of the opinion I'm not sure that for this situation with this applicant that if they didn't submit a landscape plan I'm not sure that it biases the Planning Board one way or another whether there's a landscape plan or not for what they're trying to remove.

11 CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: I understand. And I just think of the precedent in terms of when we have had 12 13 a significant removal. And again, I do agree with you 14 that the number sounds high, but if I was to go back and 15 adjust that tree permit to be more accurate I think we'd 16 be in the low -- we'd probably be in the 10/12 range, 17 not the 19 range. Again, it is what it is. To go back and change it now is kind of after the fact. 18 That's why 19 I think a nominal deposit is what Howard had mentioned 20 because there is some screening issues. You know, we 21 did notice how it's wide open to the neighbors. We 22 thought there would be a more of a privacy fence. Α 23 chain-link is not going to offer any kind of screening 24 whatsoever. The planting that you're going to do is. 25 And a lot of what you're looking at doing, the redbuds,

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1	you know, the trees that you have here on the
2	preliminary will go a long way to adding the privacy
3	that, you know, you and your neighbors want.
4	Again, I don't think we're talking about a big
5	number here. In the past when it was a complete
6	landscape plan and we've had to put and we had the
7	homeowner put up a deposit, you know, I was kind of
8	shocked that it went through, but it was a very, very
9	big number. I don't think we're talking about that kind
10	of number.
11	Howard, you had mentioned something. If you
12	want to elaborate what you were saying earlier.
13	MR. AVRUTINE: Well, again, it's really a
14	function of the scope of the project, so the Board has
15	discretion in terms of the amount of the deposit. And
16	as the Chairman mentioned, upon certification by
17	Mr. Grace, the landscaper, that the work has been
18	performed in accordance with the approved plan, the
19	deposit would be returned to the applicant.
20	MS. CUCCIA: My only concern is that winter is
21	coming and that's one
22	MR. CUCCIA: Probably most of these trees
23	after being cut down will be already after the fact that
24	you can plant trees for the season. So we probably
25	wouldn't be putting in new trees until the spring at

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1 this point. CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: Well, again, the 2 deposit can be, you know, if this gets approved tonight 3 and you delay doing the work until the spring, you 4 5 wouldn't have to put up the deposit until you wanted to remove the trees and then plant. 6 7 MR. CUCCIA: He's ready to remove the trees That's not the issue. But to replant, there's 8 now. only certain windows of the year to do healthy planting 9 10 of new trees, and that window is almost gone. It's the 11 fall already. 12 MS. CUCCIA: And the other question is that what he said to me was that the tree farms out east have 13 certain trees that are available at certain times of 14 15 year and slim pickings are coming at this point in time because it is late in the season. If you go early 16 17 March, you have a lot more to choose from. So I would hate to have to take whatever is available just to 18 19 fulfill the landscape plan because I kind of really know 20 what I want. And the variety of cherry trees, the Okame 21 cherry, the Kwanzan cherries, the specific dogwood trees 22 that we've already seen in person, if they're not 23 available I don't want have to just take any substitute 24 at this point in time.

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CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: We don't want you to do

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1 anything you don't want to do at your own house. The other thing is, I'm looking 2 MS. CUCCIA: 3 to absolutely replace the trees at this point. Honestly, I have to be completely honest, I am not 4 looking to get into a hundred thousand dollars worth of 5 landscape overnight. We're looking to do it in time. 6 7 And as far as all the planting being done at once, I'm not ready to do everything all at once. That's why we 8 were going to replace the trees first and then go on and 9 10 do the rest and stage it in that fashion that it wouldn't be --11 12 CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: And the deposit that I 13 mentioned, it wouldn't be for the complete landscape 14 plan or what you want to do eventually. It would just 15 be what you've highlighted on the plan that you submitted. And again, the Board in the past, you gave 16 17 us a number of about I believe 15 trees that you're 18 planning on at minimum planting --19 MS. CUCCIA: Yes. 20 CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: -- and some varieties, 21 and really, you know, again it's your house and your 22 backyard and we're not here to say, no, we want that 23 tree there, that's out of the question, but the numbers 24 is where we kind of --25 So, I want to ask the rest of the Board

1	members their thoughts on a nominal deposit as we've
2	done in the past. Howard had mentioned \$2,500. What is
3	the other Board members thoughts on that? Do you think
4	it's necessary or do you think
5	MEMBER GALTIERI: Chris, just clear up a
6	little confusion for me. When we looked at this
7	application, it was for clearing trees for various
8	reasons, right. Some of them are dead. Some of them
9	wanted to add some space for future plantings. I didn't
10	see a landscape plan attached to this thing, right. Is
11	there one that I missed?
12	CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: It was on the survey
13	that showed the it was part of the application, a
14	survey showing you know, it wasn't a typical
15	landscape plan. It was just a survey showing, in the
16	upper right corner, showing an area of circles and
17	numbers in terms of the trees that they want to plant.
18	we had discussed it at the site visit.
19	MEMBER GALTIERI: Right. But I didn't see a
20	Joe Grace formalized landscape plan attached to this.
21	MS. CUCCIA: No.
22	MR. CUCCIA: Because we were asked if we were
23	to add any trees what we would add and where they would
24	be, and we could have put nothing and just requested to
25	cut trees down and then we wouldn't be asked for a

1	deposit. So I don't really feel it's fair because we
2	were up front saying we would like to replace with these
3	trees. Which, by the way, the arborist said you picked
4	unbelievably great selections, and I have to be
5	penalized for putting it down when we didn't have to.
6	MEMBER ABRAMS: The plan also says, it's
7	preliminary and enhanced landscape plan is being drawn
8	to include many other plantings. We don't know where
9	any of that is. When we walked the property, I'm not
10	sure any of us looked at what was planned to go in
11	there. We knew that they were going to get replaced,
12	but I didn't think that at that instant in time we were
13	also asking the Cuccias to make a commitment on what
14	that landscape plan looked like because it looked like
15	they were justified to remove the trees regardless of
16	whether they had a landscape plan or not.
17	MEMBER GALTIERI: Chris, my query or my
18	question is, taking a deposit on a landscape plan that
19	doesn't quite exist, I don't feel comfortable with that.
20	CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: Okay.
21	Nancy?
22	MEMBER JONES: I kind of agree with Jim at
23	this point.
24	CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: So, Howard, I think
25	we're in agreement.

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MEMBER GALTIERI: I think at such time if they
are going to put a landscape plan in, you know, that's
something we could look at at some point in time as to
whether or not it falls within our jurisdiction, our
agreement of what should go in. But to take a
deposit I mean, if Joe Grace comes back and says I'm
going to put one tree in, I mean, what are you putting a
deposit against? You've got to have the complete set
for me to be comfortable to take a deposit.

MR. AVRUTINE: Let me just explain. 10 So if the 11 Board wishes to, the Board can approve the application 12 to remove the trees subject to submission of a landscape plan to the satisfaction of the Planning Board. That's 13 However, just so the Board is aware, without the 14 fine. 15 deposit, the ability to enforce that, you know, becomes a little more difficult because once the trees are taken 16 17 down, the trees are taken down. But you could put that condition in and it could be given a time frame, if the 18 19 Board were inclined to do that, for submission of the 20 comprehensive landscape plan, and that if you want to set up parameters, I don't know if the Board wants to 21 22 set up parameters for the work to be done, or just a 23 submission of a plan for the Board to review. But it 24 becomes an enforcement issue if the plan is never 25 submitted to the Board.

1	CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: Howard, from what
2	Mrs. Cuccia is saying, I don't know if they're
2	necessarily going to draw up, you know, and want to pay
4	the money to draw up a plan because I think they're
5	going to work with their arborist and say we want this
6	tree here, we want that tree there. And then have to
7	pay someone to formalize that, and it is not enforceable
8	anyway, I think that's an expense for the homeowner.
9	MR. AVRUTINE: Well, of course. Then in this
10	case
11	CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: A deposit is something
12	you're getting back.
13	MR. AVRUTINE: In this case then the Board may
14	just want to consider considering the application to
15	remove the trees and leave it at that. That's your
16	other option.
17	CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: And again, I want to
18	clarify. In the past when we've done a deposit, it was
19	more where it wasn't the backyard. It was in a setback
20	in the front. It was very visible and we wanted to
21	ensure that stuff is going to get planted and the proper
22	screening was going to replaced.
23	MEMBER ABRAMS: Absolutely.
24	CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: So I think we can
25	MEMBER ABRAMS: Chris, I absolutely agree. If
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we were in the front of the house we'd have an entirely different story here. But we largely have dead or poor looking trees that are in the back side of the house, and I think just getting rid of them, even for the neighbors that are able to see them, I think they'd be happy to see dead trees gone.

7 CHAIRMAN HADJANDREAS: And one thing, I'm not sure if the neighbor is still on the Zoom or not, but 8 one thing that was highlighted by the arborist was that 9 the larger trees are not being removed and these are 10 11 basically understory trees that they're asking to remove 12 and with very little or no canopy in many instances. SO the over, the larger trees, again, are staying and the 13 small trees are what's in that number of 19. 14
